Definitions

Civil Liberties

"Limitations on government power, intended to protect freedoms that governments may not legally intrude on." (Krutz, 110)

Civil Rights

"Guarantees that government officials will treat people equally and that decisions will be made on the basis of merit rather than race, gender, or other personal characteristics." (Krutz, 110)



Civil Liberties in the Constitution

Article I, Section 9

- No bills of attainder (imprisonment without trial)
- No ex post facto laws (retroactive punishment)
- No suspension of habeas corpus (neutral judge determines detention)

Constitutional protections not enough for Anti-Federalists

Civil Liberties in the Bill of Rights

- Religion, speech, assembly, petition (I)
- Keep and bear arms (II)
- No housing of soldiers (III)
- Unreasonable search and seizure (IV)
- Criminal, due process, grant jury, testimony (V)
- Speedy trial by jury (VI)
- Jury trial in civil cases (VII)
- Excessive bail, fines, cruel and unusual (VIII)
- Rights retained by people (IX)
- Rights retained by states (X)


