

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
#### What is your primary source of news?





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## Much Has Changed in 20 Years



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
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## Change

- Rising and Decline
- beginning, middle, end, heroes, villains, victims, change





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#### **Power**

- Helplessness and Control
- Common element in all is the assertion of choice
- Beginning, middle, end, heroes, villains, victims, change



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## **Accountability**

Only a free and unrestrained press can effectively expose deception in government. And paramount among the responsibilities of a free press is the duty to prevent any part of the government from deceiving the people and sending them off to distance lands to die of foreign fevers and foreign shot and shell. Justice Hugo Black (1971, 6-3 decision on Pentagon Papers)

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

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

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# Op-Eds

- Short, 750-800 words
- Has a clearly defined point
- Has a clearly defined point of view
- Represents clarity of thinking
- Contains strong, unique voice of the writer

## Questions to Ask Yourself

- Do I have a clear point to make?
- What is it?
- Who cares? (Audience)
- Is there substance to my argument?

# Topic and Theme

- Topic: person, place, issue, incident primary focus of the column
- Should be stated in first paragraph
- Theme: What is the big overarching idea of the column?

## The Beginning and End

- The beginning: First sentence is key, need a good hook strong claim, surprising fact, metaphor, mystery, counterintuitive observation
- The End: Need a strong ending
- Echoes or answers introduction
- Foreshadowed by preceding statements
- Is last and most memorable detail
- Contains final epiphany or calls the reader to action

## Voice

- Op-eds are conversational, imagine you are talking with your reader
- Read your op-ed out loud! Good for editing and hearing your "voice"
- Use active voice (no academic speak)
