Citizen Participation

Citizens Suits

- Part of enforcing both SDWA and CWA
- CWA most citizen suit activity
- Method of influencing implementation
- File suit, EPA responds, if they do nothing there are other remedies:
 - Injunctive relief
 - Civil penalties
- Fire alarm oversight
- Citizens or groups? Does it matter?

Decentralization

- Big role for state and municipal governments
- Fragmented regulation of surface and groundwater
- 27 federal agencies
- Networked government challenges

Governments as Polluters

- Municipalities present big problem with waste management
- 3 tiers:
 - Primary: floats and sinks
 - Secondary: Aeration
 - Tertiary: Additional chemical and physical treatment
- Many munis at 1, some at 2, few at 3

Cost-Benefit Analysis

- Paradox of allowable limits
- Lack of data on acceptable exposure
- Weighing of risks and costs of cleaning water
- Decreasing marginal utility argument
