


Big News

We are excited to share with you all that the Frost recently had an NSF infrastructure grant proposal funded! This means that over the next couple years we will expand and improve the collection storage infrastructure as well as digitize our massive aphid (approximately 224,000 specimens on 49,000 slides) and aquatic insect (approximately 100,000 specimens in 15,000 vials) collections. These improvements and digitization efforts will facilitate research that spans addressing native pollinator declines, epidemiology, and the effects of land use on aquatic biodiversity.


