COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

This course is intended to help prepare students for entrance into Penn State's Recreation, Park, and Tourism Management major. Students not seeking or exploring entrance into the RPTM major, or minor should not be enrolled in RPTM 101.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. To develop an understanding of the roles and significance of leisure and recreation in past and present societies.
- 2. To develop an awareness of the factors contributing to the emergence of recreation delivery systems and agencies within the recreation, park, and tourism fields.
- 3. To develop an understanding of the specific roles assumed by public, private, non-profit, and commercial agencies in contributing to contemporary recreation and leisure decisions, patterns and lifestyles.
- 4. To develop an understanding of the issues and trends currently affecting the delivery of recreation services.
- 5. To explore professional careers in the recreation, park, and tourism fields.
- 6. To develop professional communication skills including written correspondence, verbal and non-verbal interaction skills and communication through technology.
- 7. To develop an understanding of professional competencies required to maintain effective interpersonal communication with colleagues and peers.

REQUIRED TEXT

Introduction to Recreation and Leisure (2018) by Tyler Tapps and Mary Sara Wells. Additional readings and resources will be distributed in class or posted on Canvas.

SOURCES OF EVALUATION

1-Pt Assignments (15% in total):

There will be 18-20 1-pt assignments randomly assigned throughout the semester. Some exercises might take place in class, and some will be homework. These will be used to enhance students' understanding of course material and guest speaker's content. Taken together, these will count for 15% of the final grade. When 1-pt assignments are given students have till the start of the next class to complete (unless otherwise stated by the instructor). After that timeframe they will be closed, and no late submissions are accepted. The lowest 3 scores will be dropped from final grade.

Quizzes (30% in total):

There will be three quizzes during the semester (No Final Exam). There will be no make-up quizzes unless students have been authorized to do so by the instructor prior to the date of the quiz. Students who do not pre-arrange an excused absence for a quiz will receive a zero. Taken together, the quizzes will count for 30% of the final grade.

Attendance and Active Participation (10% in total):

Attendance will be taken via Top Hat at the beginning of each class and is location based, meaning you need to be present in order to receive attendance and participation points. Active participation, i.e., your willingness and enthusiasm for contributing to class discussion, as well as the quality of your contribution, will result in a positive participation grade. The professor will track every student's class participation, i.e., asking a question, answer a question or expressing an opinion in the class.

Please ensure that you properly cite any and all references. Programs such as Pages and Numbers, and other formats will not be accepted as they are not viewable in Canvas. If assignments fail to follow this format, points will be deducted.
- 5. Quizzes must be completed on the dates they are assigned and with adherence to the due date
- 6. Requests for taking quizzes or submitting assignments after the due dates require official documentation of such events such as illness, family emergency or a University-sanctioned activity.
