Morgan's Private Bank in New York City, helped me reaffirm that I made the right choice. The challenging and fast paced work atmosphere always kept the days interesting and productive. I had the opportunity to work with and learn from very successful people within the bank, attend

senior speaker series, engage in community service programs, network within the firm, and participate in social events. Everyone at J.P. Because of my great experience, I gladly accepted a full time offer at the close of the summer.

The internship search is a very difficult process,

Each interview gives you the chance to get a better idea of what you actually want to do and what type of firm you want to work for. Go into each with an open mind and use each as an opportunity to practice your interview skills so that when you come across a position that you really want you will have gotten all of your nerves out already. # From Behind the Desk: Professor Gary J. Gray, Ph.D

I am a Visiting Professor of Finance at The Pennsylvania State University. I teach, with Dr. Woolridge, the basic Finance course to undergraduates in the Smeal College of Business, and I have taught investment banking and capital markets to MBA graduate students in Smeal. The graduate course covered the financial markets, derivative securities, corporate valuation and the role of financial innovation in capital formation.

Concurrently, I maintain a consulting practice, advising and assisting financial intermediaries as well as public agencies in developing derivative products, hedging techniques, and innovative financing programs. Among the organizations I have advised and provided professional training for are: The Pennsylvania House Democratic Caucus; UBS; Citigroup; Paine Webber; Stephens Inc.; First Union Capital Markets; KeyBank Capital Markets; Williams & Connolly; and The Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission.

Previously, I was a Managing Director at Lehman Brothers and a Senior Vice President of E.F. Hutton specializing in municipal derivative products and new financing techniques and programs. Over a twenty year career at Lehman and Hutton and its predecessor firms, I served as the principal financial architect and creator of a number of new financial products including: tax-exempt zero-coupon bonds/capital appreciation bonds, agricultural revenue bonds, inverse floaters (RIBS/SAVRS), Bond Payment Obligations (BPOs), Premium Municipal Bond Receipts, detachable municipal call options (MuniCHOPs), and tax-exempt bond and preferred stock tender option programs.

I assisted in the sale of municipal bonds and derivative products to large institutional investors and presented Lehman's programs at municipal and derivatives conferences.

As an undergraduate, I attended Penn State on a football scholarship. I played inside linebacker (Academic All-American-1971) and led the defense in both tackles and interceptions. I later served as a graduate assistant football coach under Joe Paterno (see attached photo with Franco Harris, Lydell Mitchell, Jack Ham, JoePa and me). I received my Bachelors of Science in Electrical Engineering (1972) and my MBA (1977) from Penn State. I continued my graduate studies at Penn State, and received my doctorate in 1984 while working as an investment banker. My thesis, was condensed and published by the Securities Industry Association, and is titled "The Investment Banking Process for Primary Equity Securities and the Effects of SEC Rule 415."

I have published articles in The Harvard Business Review and The Municipal Finance Journal. I am the author of Running with the Bulls published by Lyons Press 2001, and the co-author of Municipal Derivative Securities: Uses and Valuation, published by Dow Jones/Irwin 1995, and Streetsmart Guide to Valuing a Stock, first edition published in 1999 and second edition in 2003 by McGraw-Hill. In my spare time, I am an avid fly fisherman, and I run in the Encierro in Pamplona, Spain each July.
