SRTEs: Useful or Useless?

At the end of every semester, all of us have received an email to evaluate our professors. Student Rating of Teaching Effectiveness (SRTEs) are intended for students to voice their opinions about each class and the professor. Each one is anonymous and the questions range from "Did you take this class as an elective?" to "What suggestions do you have to improve this class?" However, students have to wonder if their comments and suggestions are actually taken into consideration. How many times have you had a professor for multiple classes and have seen no improvement? Understandingly, not everyone's comment can be used because they are not helpful to the class. However, students need to question why professors are pushing for their SRTEs to be completed, but never make any changes. I went around campus to ask students about their thoughts on SRTEs and have excluded names to maintain the anonymous aspect.

One student said "they're worthless when it comes to tenure professors. Their setup is not appealing to students because the questions seem redundant. Also, the open-ended questions allow professors to know who wrote them because of small class sizes." Another student stated "they are a waste of my time and they don't mean anything to tenure professor." I even had one student ask me "does anyone else read them other than the professor?" Most of us want to know if anyone above the professor is aware of the professor's ratings. If almost the entire class gave the professor a low rating, can the professor choose to ignore it and continue on with their current teaching method?
