




From the Reader's Nook: A book review

Denial: A Memoir, by Jessica Stern

Take a look at Jessica Stern's CV: For over 30 years she has specialized in terrorism. This life's work has included the National Security Council on nuclear smuggling, membership on the Hoover Task Force on National Security and the Law. Stern has taught university courses at Harvard like Terrorism and Non-State Threats to International Security, and written several books: The Ultimate Terrorists (Harvard University Press, 1999), Terror in the Name of God: Why Religious Militants Kill (Ecco/Harper Collins: 2003), and ISIS: The State of Terror, with J.M. Berger (Ecco: Harper Collins, March 2015) (Stern, n.d.). When reading her work, when seeing her accomplishments and her bravery, victim seems hardly an appropriate description. But in Denial: A Memoir, from 2010, Stern fearlessly pulls back all pretenses; strips herself of all her accolades and takes her reader on an intimate journey of her own recovery from the sexual assault she and her sister endured at gunpoint as teenagers. This is not a book for the faint of heart; but Denial: A Memoir resonates in a deeply personal way, a way that may allow you the courage to slay your demons the way she has.
